A motion was made by Abraham Clarke seconded by Nathaniel Mitchel to postpone the consideration of that motion [Lee's] in order to take up the following: "That a copy of the Constitution agreed to and laid before Congress by the late Convention of the several states with their resolutions and the letter accompanying the same be transmitted to the executives of each state to be laid before their respective legislatures in order to be by them submitted to conventions of delegates to be chosen agreeably to the said resolutions of the Convention."14
