That by Him I am placed upon an honorable theater of action to sustain, in the sight of mortal and IMMORTAL beings, that character and part which He shall assign me, in order to my being trained up for perfection and immortality—and shall, from this time forth, devote my life to the service of GOD, my country, and mankind.

So help me GOD!
